 2 School. We will then remain standing for a
 3 moment of silence in recognition of those who
 4 have served education in Baltimore County. I'd
 5 like to take a special moment to recognize Ms.
 6 Joanne Murphy, a former President of the Board of
 7 Education who recently passed.
 8 (Pledge of Allegiance.) (Moment of Silence.)
 9 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Ms.
 10 Thomas. The next item is consideration of the
 11 July 9th agenda. Dr. Williams, are there any
 12 additions or changes to tonight's agenda?
 13 DR. WILLIAMS: There are no changes or
 14 additions to tonight's agenda.
 15 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Hearing none, the
 16 agenda stands as presented. Earlier this
 17 evening, the Board met in closed session pursuant
 18 to the Open Meetings Act for the following
 19 reasons. To discuss the appointment, employment,
 20 assignment, promotion, discipline, demotion,
 21 compensation, removal, resignation or performance

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1 evaluation of appointees, employees or officials
 2 over whom it has jurisdiction or any other
 3 personnel matter that affects one or more
 4 specific individuals, seven, consult with counsel
 5 to obtain legal advice.
 6 The minutes of the closed session and
 7 information summary can be found on our website
 8 at
 9 www.bcps.org/board/informational-summaries.html.
 10 The next item is selection of speakers.
 11 Sign-up cards were available to the public prior
 12 to the meeting for anyone wishing to speak at
 13 this evening's meeting. Board practice limits to
 14 10, the number of speakers at a regularly
 15 scheduled Board meeting. Each speaker is allowed
 16 three minutes to address the Board. The
 17 completed sign-up cards for this evening have
 18 been placed in this box and the first 10 drawn
 19 from the box will be our speakers for tonight
 20 during the public comment portion of the meeting.
 21 Of course, if fewer than 10 sign-up cards are

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1 received, all those who signed up will be
 2 permitted to speak.
 3 VICE CHAIR HENN: Our first speaker is
 4 Mr. Preston Snedegar. Our second speaker is Dr.
 5 Bash Pharoan. Our third speaker is Dayanna
 6 Bergman. Our fourth speaker is Muhammed Jameel.
 7 Our fifth speaker is Lily Li. Our sixth speaker
 8 is Nicole Landers and that is the final speaker.
 9 So, all speakers who signed up to speak will get
 10 a chance to speak tonight. Thank you.
 11 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Our next
 12 item is public comment. This is one of the
 13 opportunities the Board provides to hear the
 14 views and receive the advice of community
 15 members. The members of the Board appreciate
 16 hearing from interested citizens. As
 17 appropriate, we will refer your concerns to the
 18 Superintendent for follow-up by his staff.
 19 While we encourage public input on policy
 20 and programs and practices within the purview of
 21 this Board and the school system, this is not the

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1 proper forum to address specific student or
 2 employee matters, or to comment on matters that
 3 do not relate to public education in Baltimore
 4 County. We encourage everyone to utilize
 5 existing dispute resolution processes as
 6 appropriate.
 7 I remind everyone that inappropriate
 8 personal remarks or other behavior that disrupts
 9 or interferes with conduct of this meeting are
 10 out of order. I ask you to observe the
 11 three-minute clock which will let you know when
 12 your time is up. Please conclude your remarks
 13 when you hear the bell or see that time has
 14 expired. The microphone will be turned off at
 15 the end of your time and it could be turned off
 16 if a speaker addresses specific student or
 17 employee matters or is commenting on matters not
 18 related to public education in Baltimore County.
 19 If not selected, the public may submit
 20 their comments to the Board members in hard copy
 21 or via email to boe@bcps.org.

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1 I now call on our stakeholder groups to
 2 speak. This evening, as we have in past
 3 practice, when we have elected officials come to
 4 visit us, we do allow them to speak. Tonight we
 5 have with us County Councilman Wade Kach. Good
 6 evening and welcome.

7 COUNCILMAN KACH: Thank you, Kathleen. I
 8 had a meeting in my district to go to but, after
 9 last night, meeting Dr. Williams and Omar, I
 10 decided I would come here to congratulate both of
 11 them in their new positions. Talking to Dr.
 12 Williams, I was thrilled to find out he is a
 13 former math teacher as I am and as John Offerman
 14 is. I went to college with John. We graduate a
 15 few years ago and we both started in the county
 16 school system the same year, in 1970.

17 Dr. Williams being a math teacher and,
 18 John, you know what I mean by this, we do think a
 19 little differently about things. I think what I
 20 mean by that is we tend to look at evidence, we
 21 tend to look at statistics and don't consider

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1 them an inconvenient truth.

2 So, I talked with Dr. Williams last night
 3 and I'm sure, as I said, I've been here since
 4 1970. The school system has had its peaks and
 5 valleys and I know Dr. Williams, his goal is to
 6 peak and stay at the peak while he's here.

7 So, he has an awful lot to take a look at
 8 and a lot of plans to make. I know that what
 9 he's going to do is going to be based on fact.
 10 Omar is going to, that offer is still open, by
 11 the way. I won't go into the offer in front of
 12 everyone. But, he's going to be going to college
 13 in pre-med and I volunteered myself, when he
 14 becomes a doctor and stays in Maryland, you can
 15 count on me because I'm very impressed with you.

16 A lot of you don't know but, in 2013, had
 17 a meeting at my home with the current County
 18 Executive, Dana Stein, who is the Vice Chair of
 19 the Environmental and Transportation Committee,
 20 Steve Lafferty, who is now the Chairman of the
 21 Delegation and we, I actually cooked and served

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1 and they ate it all. But, the only
 2 disappointment was Dana Stein was going to bring
 3 cookies and I thought he meant homemade. He just
 4 brought Pepperidge Farm. But, oh well.

5 We sat there and talked about the School
 6 Board and the fact that we, at the time, were
 7 very frustrated with the School Board and felt as
 8 if the answer was an elected School Board. This
 9 was in 2013 and, of course, we all know the
 10 so-called disadvantages of an elected School
 11 Board and we took a look at it. We talked about
 12 the members of the House and Senate that we
 13 needed to work with and what happened was there
 14 was an education subcommittee with the county
 15 delegation. We met with the current speaker,
 16 Adrian Jones, and crafted a compromise where we
 17 have four appointed members and 7 elected
 18 members.

19 So, after meeting Dr. Williams and Omar
 20 yesterday, I thought that, well, I would divulge
 21 that story because the end result is more than I

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1 ever thought it would be. This has turned out to
 2 be fantastic. I know Kathleen Causey and Julie
 3 Henn, who is a former student of mine, so I take
 4 credit for Julie, have worked very hard when the
 5 new Board took place to get everybody to work
 6 together for the same goal and all I can say is
 7 that both Kathleen and Julie had such positive
 8 things to say about everybody on this Board. May
 9 not agree on issues but everybody here cares
 10 about our students and wants every child in our
 11 Baltimore County school system to be successful,
 12 have that opportunity to be successful.

13 When the budget came through for this
 14 year and I saw money for guidance counselors, for
 15 psychologists, for social workers, I was thrilled
 16 because the year before that, I tried to do the
 17 same thing unsuccessfully because we are, as a
 18 school system, there are many challenges in front
 19 of us and we need that support in order to help
 20 students that are coming in.

21 So, I thank you so much. There are a lot

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1 of citizens out there who study the school budget
 2 very closely. They contact me and they have very
 3 good input based on facts and I appreciate what
 4 you all did in regard to the stat program and I
 5 look forward to working with each and every one
 6 of you in the future to make this the very best
 7 school system in Maryland, in the country. We
 8 can do it and I certainly appreciate each and
 9 every one of you. Again, Dr. Williams, welcome.
 10 Omar, welcome. So, if you want to contact me,
 11 feel free to do that and I'm sure you all know
 12 how to do that. Thank you very much.
 13 (Applause.)
 14 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. I now
 15 call on our stakeholder groups to speak. First
 16 this evening, from Baltimore County Student
 17 Council and the Superintendent's Student Advisory
 18 Council, Angela Chen. Good evening and welcome.
 19 MS. CHEN: Good evening Chairwoman
 20 Causey, Vice Chairwoman Henn, Superintendent
 21 Williams and the Board of Education. Thank you

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1 for the opportunity to speak tonight.
 2 My name is Angela Chen. I'm a rising
 3 senior at Dulaney High School and I'm the
 4 Baltimore County Student Council President for
 5 this school year. Tonight, I'd like to extend a
 6 warm welcome to Dr. Williams, our new
 7 Superintendent, and my friend Omar Rashid, our
 8 new Student Member of the Board.
 9 Right now, BCSC is planning its annual
 10 fall leadership camp which is an overnight
 11 workshop retreat that takes place in the country
 12 of Maryland at River Valley Ranch in Manchester.
 13 At this event, students from all across the
 14 county network, acquire valuable leadership
 15 skills and participate in adventure activities.
 16 It's my favorite event of the year and we're
 17 working hard to make this year's FLC go off
 18 without a hitch.
 19 Finally, I look forward to working with
 20 Dr. Williams and Omar on student initiatives such
 21 as mental health and safety. Issues deeply felt

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1 by the student body. Thank you again for your
 2 time.
 3 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Ms. Chen.
 4 Our next speaker for the evening is from the
 5 Teachers Association of Baltimore County, TABCO.
 6 Ms. Abby Beytin and Ms. Cindy Sexton. Good
 7 evening and welcome.
 8 MS. BEYTIN: Good evening, Chairwoman
 9 Causey, Vice Chairwoman Henn, Dr. Williams and
 10 members of the Board.
 11 As most of you are aware, tonight is my
 12 last official Board of Education meeting as
 13 President of TABCO. I do retire on July 31st.
 14 That will be my last day.
 15 First, let me take a moment to officially
 16 welcome Dr. Williams to Baltimore County. I am
 17 expecting a great working relationship between
 18 TABCO and our new Superintendent and know he will
 19 be a staunch supporter of collaboration and
 20 working for the best outcomes for our students
 21 and our staff.

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1 As well as welcoming Omar Rashid, our new
 2 SMOB. I've met him several times already and
 3 have already been really impressed and I know you
 4 will do a wonderful job in that position.
 5 Second, I want to thank all of you for
 6 your willingness to work with me. As President
 7 of TABCO and all our members for the good of our
 8 students, we might not have always agreed on how
 9 to achieve all the myriad of goals or how to
 10 address all the issues. But, I have always
 11 believed you had the best interest of our
 12 students in your hearts.
 13 I want to leave you with these few
 14 parting words. Always thing of what is best for
 15 our children, listen to the teachers and support
 16 staff in the field. They really understand what
 17 is happening and can help you understand the
 18 ramifications of the issues in the field. Our
 19 teachers are our most important resource
 20 available in our efforts to assist our children
 21 to reach their best potential. Listen and truly

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1 hear what they have to say.
 2 Last, I'm going to turn the rest of my
 3 time over to Cindy Sexton, the incoming President
 4 of TABCO. She is ready to hit the ground running
 5 and will do a wonderful job as President.
 6 MS. SEXTON: Good evening, Chairwoman
 7 Causey, Vice Chairwoman Henn, Dr. Williams and
 8 members of the Board. It is with great hope and
 9 pleasure that I take over as the President of
 10 TABCO. I look forward to working with all of you
 11 as well as BCPS officials, administrators,
 12 educators, support staff and all stakeholders. I
 13 ask you to work with TABCO collaboratively so
 14 that together we can continue the hard work we've
 15 already begun, tackle the challenges facing us
 16 and always keep our focus on what is best for the
 17 success of our students.
 18 Please allow TABCO to be a part of every
 19 conversation that affects our students and
 20 teachers. We are the boots on the ground. We
 21 can share what works, what doesn't, what our

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1 students need and what our teachers need to be
 2 successful.
 3 Our way forward needs to include all of
 4 us as we are on this journey that will make BCPS
 5 a world class school system. Thank you.
 6 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, both.
 7 Our next speaker for this evening is from the
 8 Council of Administrative and Supervisory
 9 Employees, CASE, Mr. Tom Dehart. Good evening
 10 and welcome.
 11 MR. DEHART: Good evening, Board Chair
 12 Causey, Vice Chair Henn, Superintendent Williams
 13 and members of the Board. Welcome, Dr. Williams,
 14 to your first official School Board meeting. As
 15 you know, you're coming to Baltimore County at a
 16 time with many critical issues facing this Board,
 17 the system, communities and individual schools.
 18 However, by referencing Steven Covey's
 19 seek first to understand, then be understood,
 20 you've shown great wisdom in recognizing that
 21 there is far more right with Baltimore County

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1 Public Schools than there is wrong.
 2 As you're aware, perhaps the single most
 3 difficult but essential component of the success
 4 of any organization is consistency. Hall of Fame
 5 quarterback Roger Staubach said, in any team
 6 sport, the best teams have consistency and
 7 chemistry. This applies to Team BCPS and CASE
 8 welcomes your stated desire and, frankly, we
 9 hope, your demand for your three Cs.
 10 Communication, consistency and coherence in the
 11 daily operation of our system.
 12 The members of CASE hold positions that
 13 are the fact of BCPS. They are the front-line
 14 leadership that is crucial to the success of our
 15 system which is measured by the success of our
 16 students and, quite candidly, these folks are,
 17 all too often, the ones who are caught in the
 18 middle of inconsistent policies and practices.
 19 CASE is excited that principals will be included
 20 on the teams you are created on your 100-day
 21 entry plan around strategic leadership,

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1 relationship building and professional
 2 development. The knowledge, experience and
 3 insight gained in their position will be very
 4 helpful as you continue to get to know the
 5 system.
 6 Again, welcome, Dr. Williams. CASE looks
 7 forward to working, establishing and maintaining
 8 a long and collaborative relationship with you.
 9 Have a good night.
 10 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Our next speaker
 11 from the PTA Council of Baltimore County,
 12 President Jayne Lee. Good evening and welcome.
 13 MS. LEE: Good evening, Chairwoman
 14 Causey, Vice Chair Henn, Dr. Williams, welcome.
 15 To our student, I'm especially proud since I am a
 16 member of the Pikesville High School PTSA.
 17 I am just back from Columbus, Ohio and
 18 our national convention where I am happy to say
 19 we passed a resolution on financial literacy and
 20 supporting that all students learn financial
 21 literacy while still in school.

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1 I also can say that we held interesting
 2 elections, some going five and 6 ballots. We
 3 will be having our Maryland PTA convention in
 4 Linthicum at the end of this month which will be
 5 even more interesting because we're doing a
 6 complete by-laws revision. I spent 12 hours in
 7 committee meeting last Saturday.

8 This is a new year for us. July 1st is
 9 the beginning of our PTA year. So, we are now
 10 hitting the group running. We are planning to
 11 hold area meetings in each area of the county to
 12 work with our local units, get them into
 13 compliance. Our goal is to have every single
 14 unit in compliance so they can participate in our
 15 reflections program this coming year. We will be
 16 holding a meeting in August to set our own goals
 17 and planning, training and networking and getting
 18 our members together.

19 We look forward to meeting with Dr.
 20 Williams. We would like to do so on a regular
 21 basis. I did get two text messages on the way

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1 here. One from a committee chair of our Health
 2 and Safety Committee reminding me that I have to
 3 ask Dr. Williams to kindly include her on any
 4 committees that have anything to do with health
 5 and safety. As well as Chairwoman Causey.

6 The other was from a great partner of
 7 ours, Laurie Taylor-Mitchell and the student
 8 support network. We would like to get together
 9 with you to discuss hungry children. Hungry
 10 children cannot learn and we want to work wit you
 11 in making sure all children come to school
 12 prepared and with a belly full.

13 We will be having meetings the first
 14 Thursday of every month and you all are invited
 15 to any of those meetings. We hope you attend
 16 when we have our general meetings.

17 Other than that, I need to apologize to
 18 anyone, including students, teachers, PTA and the
 19 public who have sent me emails that have gone
 20 unanswered in the last week, for the first time
 21 in a long time, I had to take a step back and be

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1 a mother. Unfortunately, my baby, and by baby, I
 2 mean a 25-year old, had an accident with an angry
 3 dog and we have been going through rabies
 4 vaccines for the past week. So, I have not
 5 answered anyone because sometimes we have to be a
 6 mother first. But, I will be back to bringing
 7 you all the comments next meeting and we'll catch
 8 up on that as I do at most meeting. Dr.
 9 Williams, you'll learn that in the future. Thank
 10 you. Now is the time for public comment. Our
 11 first speaker for this evening is Mr. Preston
 12 Snedegar. Our overflow room is full so Mr. Smith
 13 will go and check for our speaker there. Thank
 14 you. He'll be on his way. Good evening and
 15 welcome.

16 MR. SNEDEGAR: How you doing? I was here
 17 last month, my name is Preston Snedegar. I was
 18 concerned basically on the sign-in box. I think
 19 it's outrageous the way it works. But, since
 20 there's nobody here, I get to speak. That's one
 21 of the issues I was here on first. Now we're on

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1 the second issue.

2 I'm a businessman. I've been a
 3 businessman for years. I hear all the good
 4 things that Baltimore County has done. There's a
 5 lot of things and I know the decision-makers.
 6 You all are the decision-makers.

7 I don't think a lot of things are brought
 8 to you in the proper perspective. I don't think
 9 the construction is done right. I don't think
 10 the accounting is done right. I have a CPS
 11 license and I have an MBA from Hopkins. I have
 12 two young grandchildren that are going to school
 13 here soon and I'm not happy with what I see. I'm
 14 a little emotional with them. I'll calm down.

15 The fix is relatively easy. You need a
 16 person like me who goes after them. I attack
 17 them with a vengeance you couldn't believe. I'll
 18 do that for my grandkids.

19 I go to the building and the guides say,
 20 why are you doing this? They don't use standard
 21 products. Everything is a little castle. Why?

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1 It makes no sense. You can make them look
 2 different. They don't even coat the rebars. You
 3 probably don't know what I'm talking about. I
 4 forgot to bring my rebars for you. But, anyway,
 5 there's a lot of things that need repairs.
 6 First of all, you need the money I could
 7 save you from going after the inequities and not
 8 best standard practices to fix the video that cut
 9 out while I was being announced to come here to
 10 speak. It stopped four, five or 7 or 8 times, I
 11 lost count.
 12 There's a lot of things that can be
 13 fixed, there's a lot of people willing to help.
 14 But, I'm not big on all the administration. I
 15 used to do that. My best meeting was five
 16 minutes. I loved that meeting. I know that you
 17 have a lot more things to do. But, I'm offering
 18 my assistance. You are the decision-makers.
 19 Here's what's good about it. One
 20 typewritten page with recommendations,
 21 substantiating documentation will be attached to

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1 the back. I don't write more than one page.
 2 And, I wonder about the little stakeholder thing.
 3 Would I've got an answer? Should I get an
 4 answer?
 5 I don't know your administration and I
 6 know the book is this long. You didn't do this,
 7 you didn't do that. I don't really care about
 8 all that. I don't. I care about my grandkids.
 9 Now, you're the new Superintendent, Mr.
 10 Williams, I thought I'd give you a gift. Math
 11 teacher? Sixth graders. Put your hand down.
 12 Move the index finger and your thumb over. One.
 13 Count one. Draw a triangle. Make it a right
 14 triangle. Three, four, five. One, two, three,
 15 four, five. That's how easy teaching is
 16 sometimes. But, the odds of that getting to the
 17 teachers?
 18 I used to teach for a few years. All you
 19 have to give it to your (inaudible) you have to
 20 give it to them and they'll give it to them and
 21 they'll give it to them and so on.

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1 Question for you. Why don't they have a
 2 central database that has the best lesson plans
 3 and each time a teacher adds to that and he beats
 4 somebody or she beats somebody, they're given
 5 credit for that. Everybody writes a separate
 6 lesson plan. Why? The most inefficient thing I
 7 ever saw. I've done it. (Microphone cut.)
 8 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Our next speaker for
 9 the evening is Dr. Bash Pharoan. Good evening
 10 and welcome.
 11 DR. PHAROAN: Madame Chair, can I pass
 12 this to the Superintendent?
 13 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: You can hand it over
 14 there to our staff. Thank you.
 15 DR. PHAROAN: My presentation is about
 16 it. Good evening to all. Dr. Williams, welcome.
 17 Mr. Rashid, welcome. And, of course, welcome to
 18 all of you.
 19 Our students are like the flower that I
 20 brought as a gift to you. It needs nourishment
 21 and if it got sick, it needs the right doctor,

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1 the right prescription.
 2 So, every Superintendent before you
 3 talked about diversity, talked about inclusion,
 4 talked about equity and equality. Very little
 5 was done. Dr. Berger, in about 1995, closed the
 6 schools on Jewish holidays because that's his
 7 holiday. Dr. Hairston came in, he was a status
 8 quo Superintendent. He actually gave the
 9 impression, wrongfully to all of us, that it is a
 10 state-sponsored holiday which was false.
 11 Then, this past June in this calendar,
 12 professional day was supposed to be coinciding
 13 with Eid al-Fitr. The school administration
 14 basically made it an open day. School
 15 administration sacrificed our culture, our faith,
 16 and did not do the same thing for our Jewish
 17 cousins. If that's not really a discrimination,
 18 I honestly don't know what discrimination is.
 19 Another observation is that over the past
 20 15 years, I have yet to see one Muslim teacher
 21 come in and be an employee. I have yet to see a

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1 Sikh teacher with a turban. There might be some,
 2 I don't know. I don't have statistics.
 3 But, it's such a drastic ban on Muslims
 4 in Baltimore County Public Schools that is
 5 hidden, clandestine and is being done in a very
 6 consistent way.
 7 So, you are our hope. You are our hope
 8 for the buildings and for the people inside. Our
 9 students, and I'm really glad to see Mr. Rashid
 10 here. Our students are really no different than
 11 any other faith or national origin. All what I
 12 am asking is really for this Board and every
 13 member and you, as our administrator, is to treat
 14 the Jewish holidays equal to the Muslim holidays.
 15 Equal must mean equal. It cannot be
 16 parsed. It cannot be manipulated. It cannot be
 17 done in a smart way. It really cannot. My
 18 personal hope is that you would implement that
 19 after 25 years of me being involved with the
 20 school system. It's about time. Thank you and
 21 welcome.

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1 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Dr.
 2 Pharoan. Our next speaker for this evening is
 3 Dayanna Bergman. Good evening and welcome.
 4 MS. BERGMAN: Summertime, I'm so excited.
 5 Congratulations, Mr. Williams. I should say Dr.
 6 Williams.
 7 First, I want to give a shout-out and
 8 happy birthday to Ms. Pasteur. She's not here
 9 today but it's her birthday. Dr. Williams, you
 10 were my assistant principal back in 1997 in
 11 Springbrook High School. So, it's flashback
 12 time. Taking it back to '97 in Springbrook and
 13 what we did in Montgomery County because this is
 14 going to be awesome.
 15 We had the Hispanic Assembly that our
 16 late Mr. (Inaudible) used to do our Spanish
 17 Assembly, our Hispanic Assembly. We took great
 18 pride in doing that culturally.
 19 We had International Night for everybody.
 20 We had Black History. We used to do these
 21 beautiful assemblies in Springbrook High School.

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1 Dr. Williams knows what I'm talking about. We
 2 were such a diverse high school and, with all the
 3 years and experience he has now, the potential of
 4 what he could absolutely do for Team BCPS. I am
 5 so excited and welcome to the family.
 6 I am just full of joy. I hope that
 7 everybody is getting ready. But shout-out to all
 8 our administrators, they're doing a lot of
 9 hiring. I know the HR Department and they're
 10 working very hard. Do you see all those people
 11 back there? They're getting promoted. So, that
 12 means they're getting more staff. So, that's
 13 awesome.
 14 I am just so confident of what the future
 15 is going to look like for Baltimore County and
 16 how we're going to make Baltimore County better.
 17 I've been saying this message since the campaign
 18 with our former Student Board Member. Have you
 19 met my friend, Johnny? He's a County Executive
 20 now. He's awesome.
 21 Education is just going to be world class

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1 in the State of Maryland. I absolutely believe
 2 that.
 3 Now, I have to give you a heads-up. I
 4 know probably nobody wants to tell you the ins
 5 and outs and who to be careful. First of all, on
 6 the west side, don't mess with the Delta girls.
 7 They're awesome, just don't get on their bad
 8 side.
 9 Number two, you guys have to come tour
 10 with me to Lansdowne High School. So, you have
 11 to have a full tour of Lansdowne High School. It
 12 is our poster child.
 13 So, we've got to focus 2020. We've got
 14 to go to Annapolis and ask for money to make sure
 15 we build these schools. We need healthy schools
 16 and we need to make sure that Baltimore County,
 17 moving forward, doesn't just hand out an
 18 invitation and invite everybody to dance. We
 19 have to ask everybody at the party to be part of
 20 a better Baltimore County. Thank you.
 21 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Our next

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1 speaker for the evening is Dr. Muhammed Jameel.
 2 Good evening and welcome.
 3 MR. JAMEEL: Thank you. Blessings and
 4 good evening to all. I'm very proud to, first,
 5 welcome Omar Rashid. He's the member who has not
 6 come just because he happens to be a minority.
 7 He comes with a high meritorious record. That is
 8 to be acknowledged and I welcome you.
 9 Dr. Williams, you're welcome to this
 10 Board. I was one of the PTA Presidents in this
 11 system when you graduated from high school. All
 12 three of my children graduated from BCPS when you
 13 moved to Montgomery County.
 14 The point is that during all this time, I
 15 have seen and experienced the seismic change that
 16 has taken place in BCPS. It became a minority
 17 majority school just recently compared to
 18 Montgomery County.
 19 My hope is that you shall be a bold and
 20 strong leader. In my naval training, I was
 21 taught that a good officer is never popular and a

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1 popular officer is never a good officer. Only
 2 their history makes them popular.
 3 You have to be an unpopular
 4 Superintendent of this school system if you want
 5 to fix the inequities that exist that I have
 6 observed since your high school graduation.
 7 Councilman Kach mentioned about peaks and
 8 valleys. Yes, there are peaks and valleys. But
 9 the valleys keep on getting wider. You have to
 10 take a deep interest and dig into the facts
 11 without being popular, without trying to maintain
 12 the status quo.
 13 The Muslims have been standing here many
 14 times. You talk about numbers, math. Numbers
 15 seem to count but we do not have a mob mentality
 16 that we should fill up this room every day and
 17 every meeting to only ask for justice, equal
 18 justice, equality for Muslims. All the talk
 19 about secularity, about the rationality, the
 20 numbers game, does not amount to justice. Where
 21 there is no justice (microphone cut).

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1 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Our next
 2 speaker for the evening is Ms. Lily Li. Good
 3 evening and welcome.
 4 MS. LI: Thank you. (Inaudible) members,
 5 my name is Lily Li, a parent of BCPS students.
 6 I'm here to welcome our new Superintendent, Dr.
 7 Williams.
 8 With the new Superintendent, Dr.
 9 Williams, coming to our Baltimore County Public
 10 Schools, we parents and community members are now
 11 seeing a new hope. A new beginning for our
 12 children.
 13 Our new hope is our children will truly
 14 be the focus of the BCPS system, but not tools or
 15 machines for some personal or political agenda.
 16 Like in the prior, prior Superintendent's era and
 17 its follow-up.
 18 With the new time and new era coming now,
 19 I want to bring some attention to guidance
 20 counselors in middle and high schools. From my
 21 personal experience and complaints from some of

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1 my friends, I have to say that most of the
 2 guidance counselors are doing their job but there
 3 are a few who are doing some power abuse or doing
 4 things in violation of BCPS guidelines.
 5 So, nowadays, BCPS middle and high
 6 schools have widespread school violence issues.
 7 I don't know if counselors are just overburdened
 8 by this widespread school violence things or they
 9 just want to pick on easy targets.
 10 Some counselors don't want to put efforts
 11 to physically violent students but, instead, turn
 12 extreme attention to students who are not saying
 13 political correct things. The guidance
 14 counselors and his delegates call out the names
 15 of those not politically correct students in
 16 public during lunch session to humiliate them and
 17 damage their self-dignity. That's abuse of
 18 power. That's totally against the guidelines
 19 from the counselor's office.
 20 The guidelines said something like
 21 counselors should talk to the student in person

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1 but not in public. Especially, not purposely
 2 humiliating them in public.
 3 Teenagers are teenagers. They are
 4 difficult. Due to their body chemicals,
 5 teenagers are especially sensitive to the ways
 6 they are treated, especially in public or when
 7 other students are around.
 8 Also, we all know that school counselors
 9 are paid much, much more than regular teachers
 10 because their job requires more loving and
 11 professional trainings.
 12 So, I'm urging BCPS to put the utmost
 13 important requirement when hiring a new
 14 counselor, a loving heart. I know we need more
 15 and more counselors in our schools. But, we need
 16 good ones, not bad ones.
 17 Also, I'm urging BCPS to give new
 18 counselors extensive training about how to work
 19 with students, especially the middle and the high
 20 school students due to the sensitivity of their
 21 age and their special face of mental perception

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1 and development. Thank you so much.
 2 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Our
 3 final public comment speaker for this evening is
 4 Nicole Landers. Good evening and welcome.
 5 MS. LANDERS: Good evening. Thank you.
 6 Welcome, Dr. Williams and Omar. You mostly know
 7 me but, for Dr. Williams and Omar, you don't. I
 8 typically come and talk about school violence.
 9 That's not what I'm here for tonight.
 10 Dr. Williams, my children were removed
 11 from the school system by me and my husband last
 12 year after my daughter was sexually assaulted in
 13 the 5th grade and my son was bullied so severely,
 14 he became suicidal in the 4th.
 15 When I removed them, because the county
 16 didn't take action, I placed them in a small
 17 private school. My learning curve has been
 18 immense over this year as a learned just how far
 19 behind they were. They were A/B students in the
 20 public school, in a blue ribbon school. In the
 21 private school, they were years behind their

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1 appropriate progressive track for their age.
 2 Upon research, I've come up with a lot of
 3 findings that I'm deeply concerned about as a
 4 parent and a taxpayer in this county. I want to
 5 understand why nearly 61 percent of the students
 6 in the 4th grade are not reading proficient. I
 7 want to understand why, amongst our county's 8th
 8 grade students, only 31 percent are capable of
 9 getting a B or higher in Algebra. I want to
 10 understand how the SAT scores have dropped from
 11 2013 at a 1,322, to 2018 at a 977. I want to
 12 understand why 75 percent of applicants to CCBC
 13 are not able to pass a 7th grade Accuplacer exam.
 14 Most of these applicants are coming from BCPS.
 15 I pay one third less the cost than you're
 16 paying per student in this county and, in one
 17 year's time, my students have gone from not being
 18 able to recognize an adjective or an adverb, to
 19 writing an MLA format and deriving Latin. It
 20 makes no sense to me why our students in the
 21 county are so far behind or why I should pay the

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1 taxes and then pay again just to be able to get
 2 my children educated at a college-ready level.
 3 It's the onus of responsibility on all of
 4 us. The Board, the staff, the teachers, the
 5 administrators, to do better than this by our
 6 kids. Education is the backbone of our community
 7 and if we don't do something about this, we will
 8 lose our community. The students can't read.
 9 They can't do math.
 10 Dr. Williams, my students, my children,
 11 they didn't know their basic math facts. They
 12 couldn't long divide. I had to hire two tutors
 13 this year to bring them up. It should not be the
 14 case.
 15 I implore you as you're learning to broad
 16 scope your investigation so that you can improve
 17 this for the students. Thank you.
 18 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. That
 19 concludes our public comment portion. We now
 20 move forward with the opportunity for community
 21 members to comment on Board policy. So, we have,

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1 related to public comment on proposed changes to
 2 Policy 1260, Community Relations, Community
 3 Involvement, School Volunteers. The first
 4 speaker that's signed up is Ms. Dayanna Bergman.
 5 MS. BERGMAN: What was the first policy?
 6 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Policy 1260.
 7 MS. BERGMAN: Okay, 1260. I like that
 8 the language on the policy is short like it
 9 should be. One of the things that I would
 10 suggest, and this is part of what happens with
 11 the rule, our training videos for volunteers for
 12 BCPS is only available in English and we have a
 13 lot of parents in our school system that speak
 14 different languages. I think it's over
 15 90-something languages spoken throughout all
 16 Baltimore County schools.
 17 So, everybody has to look at the same
 18 video and then, after you do the video, you get
 19 your certificate for volunteer training. The
 20 problem that we have in BCPS is that we're
 21 looking at a video and getting our certificate in

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1 some of our communities and we don't even
 2 understand the language.
 3 I have a very large Hispanic community in
 4 the southwest portion of Baltimore County and we
 5 have to do the video training and we run into
 6 problems when the parents have volunteered, done
 7 the video, got the certificate, takes a child on
 8 a field trip because, don't forget, about two
 9 school years ago, they lost my kid at the zoo.
 10 We did not have a plan of understanding
 11 of what we were supposed to do at the time. So,
 12 to have the whole community feel included, I
 13 think we need to look at the video and update.
 14 The video is outdated. We need to revise that
 15 video for the volunteer training and we also have
 16 to do voice over and at least some of the major
 17 spoken languages in our county. We just want to
 18 make sure the message is being communicated
 19 clearly to everybody that's part of our county.
 20 So, that's what I have to say. Thank you.
 21 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Our next

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1 speaker for Policy 1260 is Dr. Bash Pharoan.
 2 DR. PHAROAN: Chair, I have very brief
 3 comments that apply to all of them. Can I do it
 4 at the end?
 5 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: You can do it right
 6 now, if it saves time. Ms. Bergman, if you want
 7 to stay seated, because you're on the next policy
 8 as well.
 9 DR. PHAROAN: Two minutes. Maybe I can
 10 save the rest of the minutes for later. Good
 11 evening to all.
 12 Basically, I'd like to keep my comments
 13 really general for your thoughts. It's really
 14 triggered by the 8315 and the 1260, volunteerism.
 15 So, one point is I really believe and I
 16 really like to see Board members give their
 17 feedback to the public. I have been, basically,
 18 here for a long time. I write emails, I come in
 19 here and I really rarely ever get anything in
 20 response. I think this is really a shared thing
 21 among other members.

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1 In the same token, the stakeholders,
 2 which are supposed to be representing the public,
 3 they need to be more visible. I really don't
 4 know how the policies are effective in that. I
 5 know policies are written by our esteemed lawyers
 6 and for a good reason. But, at the end of the
 7 day, I have been here for almost 15 years. I
 8 come in early, early on, usually 8, 9, 10
 9 stakeholders come to speak. Now, if it is three
 10 or four and oftentimes it's really soft, thank
 11 yous, appreciation, stuff like that.
 12 Somehow our policies need to strengthen
 13 our system of stakeholders where they are
 14 accountable, they know what they need to do and
 15 what they should do. Of course, they are holding
 16 the Board accountable, too, and it's a two-way
 17 system.
 18 Last but not least, I really thank you
 19 for putting up with me. (Laughter.)
 20 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Our net
 21 policy is Policy 3230, Non-Instructional

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1 Services, Purchasing, Qualification of Vendors.
 2 Ms. Bergman?
 3 MS. BERGMAN: So, Policy 3230, again, is
 4 very simple, to the point and directs what the
 5 rules should be. I'm excited when I see policies
 6 that are written as such.
 7 Regarding the qualification of vendors, I
 8 just want to make sure that each school house has
 9 the opportunity to, especially our Title I
 10 schools. I understand they have to meet certain
 11 guidelines. But, when they're trying to stretch
 12 that dollar to get a vendor to get more bang for
 13 their buck, in the past, they've only been
 14 allowed to look at certain vendors and that was
 15 it.
 16 So, if you could get the same product
 17 that you needed for a school house for 750 kids,
 18 you had to pay twice or three times as much.
 19 So, I would like to make sure that we
 20 give all the vendors, especially local vendors,
 21 the opportunity to supply contract agreements for

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1 BCPS. Thank you.
 2 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. You can
 3 stay right there because you are also the next
 4 speaker for Policy 8130 which is Internal Board
 5 Policies, Organization, Formulation.
 6 MS. BERGMAN: This policy is really,
 7 really long. So, I didn't get a complete chance
 8 but the overview of it is I do think that when
 9 we're looking at the formula for internal Board
 10 policy, that we have to include everybody's
 11 voice, all organizations related to education, as
 12 decision-makers. We have to make sure that our
 13 teachers and supporting staff have a voice. They
 14 haven't had a voice in the past. There's been
 15 decisions in the past that were made and nobody
 16 even bothered to ask them what your input, and
 17 they're the boots on the ground in our system.
 18 Same thing with parents. So, that's all I have
 19 to say about that. Thanks.
 20 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: You are also signed
 21 up to speak on the final policy which is Policy

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1 8315 which is Internal Board Policies,
 2 Operations, Meetings, Participation by the
 3 Public.
 4 MS. BERGMAN: Oh. Well, I think what I
 5 said earlier applied to this one. So, yes.
 6 Again, all stakeholders in the community should
 7 have an accurate voice of the community.
 8 I also will add our communities look very
 9 different. I've been living in Baltimore County
 10 for almost 9 years. August will be 9 years that
 11 I've been a Baltimore county resident with my
 12 family. My community looks completely different.
 13 We have a lot of new organizations that have come
 14 up and they're not part of the conversation and
 15 they should be because they're part of our
 16 community and our school system.
 17 So, I think that should be taken into
 18 consideration. It should be very clear how we
 19 define stakeholders. Thanks.
 20 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. That
 21 concludes our stakeholder portion. I do want to

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1 make an addition to an earlier announcement.
 2 Earlier this evening when the Board met in closed
 3 session pursuant to the Open Meetings Act, we
 4 also met for Item Number 8 which is to consult
 5 with staff, consultant or other individuals about
 6 pending or potential litigation.
 7 So, that brings us to the next item on
 8 the agenda, Item F, Superintendent's Report. For
 9 that, I welcome Dr. Williams.
 10 DR. WILLIAMS: Thank you and good
 11 evening. I would like to start by thanking the
 12 Board, students, families and community members
 13 of Team BCPS for welcoming me to this role. I
 14 thank Ms. Bergman for not bringing pictures from
 15 back in 1997 also.
 16 I look forward to getting to know you as
 17 I travel around the county. Look for my new
 18 blog, Super Steps, for a peak at where I've been
 19 so far.
 20 As we begin our work together, it's
 21 important for you to know where my focus lies.

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<p>1 That's on high quality teaching and learning in 2 every classroom.</p> <p>3 You will hear me talk about raising the 4 bar, closing the gaps and preparing for our 5 future because I had the benefit of teachers who 6 held me to high standards while they provided 7 support.</p> <p>8 I want to make sure that every one of our 9 students has the opportunity to succeed in school 10 and throughout their lives.</p> <p>11 So, my first meeting with students 12 occurred on Monday. 13 Members of the Board, the Policy Review
 14 Committee asks that the Board accept this report
 15 of the Committee's recommendation to amend the
 16 following policies. Policy 1270, Parent and
 17 Family Engagement, Policy 3720, Behavior Threat
 18 Assessment. Policy 4104, Technology Acceptable
 19 Use Policy for Authorized Users. Policy 6202,
 20 Technology Acceptable Use Policy for Students.
 21 These recommendations have been presented

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1 to you on tonight's agenda as Exhibit I. The
 2 committee considered public comments received
 3 during the Board's public meeting on June 11,
 4 2019. Do I have a motion to adopt the
 5 recommendations of the Board's Policy Review
 6 Committee?

7 MS. MACK: So moved.

8 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Ms. Mack.
 9 No second is required. Is there any discussion
 10 or comments from the Board? Hearing none, those
 11 in favor, please raise your hand. Any opposed?
 12 The motion carries unanimously. Thank you very
 13 much.

14 The next item, Item J, New Business,
 15 Personnel Matters. For that, we call forward Dr.
 16 Mayo. Good evening, Dr. Mayo.

17 DR. MAYO: Good evening, Chairwoman
 18 Causey, Vice Chairwoman Henn, Dr. Williams,
 19 members of the Board. I would like Board consent
 20 for the following personnel matters.
 21 Retirements, resignations, leaves, certificated

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1 appointments and Southeast Area Advisory Council
 2 appointment.

3 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Do I have a motion
 4 to approve the personnel matters presented in J1
 5 through J5?

6 VOICE: So moved.

7 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Do I have a second?
 8 VOICE: Second.

9 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: All in favor, please
 10 raise your hands. Any opposed? The motion
 11 carries unanimously. The next item of business
 12 is administrative appointments and I call on Dr.
 13 Williams.

14 DR. WILLIAMS: Madame Chair and members
 15 of the Board, I would like to bring for your
 16 approval the following administrative
 17 appointments. There are 20.
 18 Principal of Featherbed Lane Elementary
 19 School, principal of Hebbville Elementary School.
 20 Principal of Meadowwood Educational Center.
 21 Principal of Northwest Academy of Health

 3 Assistant Principal, Bear Creek
 4 Elementary School. Assistant Principal, Colgate
 5 Elementary School. Assistant Principal, Eastern
 6 Technical High School. Assistant Principal,
 7 Featherbed Lane Elementary School. Assistant
 8 Principal, Kenwood High School. Assistant
 9 Principal, Overlea High School. Assistant
 10 Principal of Owings Mills Elementary School.
 11 Assistant Principal of Scott's Branch Elementary
 12 School. Assistant Principal, Stemmers Run Middle
 13 School. Assistant Principal, Westtown Elementary
 14 School. Assistant Principal, Woodholme
 15 Elementary School. Coordinator of Career
 16 Development and Youth Apprenticeship, Senior
 17 Operations Supervisor, HVACBA Office of
 18 Facilities Support Services Supervisor, Language
 19 Arts Office of English Language Arts.
 20 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Do I have a motion
 21 to approve the administrative appointments as

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1 presented in Exhibit K1?
 2 MS. MACK: So moved.
 3 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Ms. Mack.
 4 Do I have a second?
 5 MR. OFFERMAN: Second.
 6 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Mr.
 7 Offerman. Is there any discussion? All in
 8 favor, please raise your hand. Any opposed? The
 9 motion carries unanimously. (Applause.) Dr.
 10 Williams?
 11 DR. WILLIAMS: As I call your name,
 12 please come forward or raise your hand, whatever
 13 may be appropriate. This is in alphabetical
 14 order.
 15 Coming forward is Patricia Angelini who
 16 is the new principal of Warren Elementary School.
 17 (Applause.) We added a special touch of having
 18 the pictures posted so everyone can see. She
 19 brings forth 26 years of experience in Baltimore
 20 County. Supporting her tonight are her husband,
 21 Nick and her daughters, Olivia and Sophia.

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1 (Applause.)
 2 Mr. Zachary Clark, assistant principal
 3 for Overlea High School. He has 6 years of
 4 experience in Baltimore County. Supporting him
 5 tonight are his wife, Laura, principal Monica
 6 Sample from Overlea High School, assistant
 7 principal Brittany Keith, Overlea High School,
 8 assistant principal, Kevin Watley, Overlea High
 9 School, and assistant principal Robert Colvert,
 10 Hereford High School. Congratulations.
 11 (Applause.)
 12 Next, we have Jennifer Conrad, the
 13 assistant principal of Owings Mills Elementary
 14 School. She brings to us 23 years of service in
 15 Baltimore County. Supporting her tonight are the
 16 following, her husband Pat, daughter Gwynn and
 17 daughter Devin, former principal Chett Scott,
 18 Owings Mills Elementary School, current
 19 principal, Scott Conway, Owings Mills Elementary
 20 School, and fellow assistant principal, Andrea
 21 Butler, Owings Mills Elementary School.

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1 Congratulations. (Applause.)
 2 Next, we have Jordan Felderman, new
 3 principal of Hebbville Elementary School. He has
 4 8 years of service in Baltimore County.
 5 Supporting him tonight is Rochelle Archulus,
 6 principal of Woodlawn Middle School.
 7 Congratulations. (Applause.)
 8 Next, we have Colleen Fitzmaurice, the
 9 principal of River Hill Elementary School. She
 10 brings 9 years of experience in Baltimore County.
 11 Supporting her tonight are her parents, Mary and
 12 John Fitzmaurice. Congratulations. (Applause.)
 13 Next, we have Christine Gibbison, the
 14 assistant principal of Colgate Elementary School.
 15 She brings 7 years of experience in Baltimore
 16 County. Supporting her tonight are the
 17 following. Her husband, Joe and her brother,
 18 Mitchell Whitlock. (Applause.)
 19 Next, we have Michael Jones, principal of
 20 Northwest Academy of Health Sciences. He has 10
 21 years of service in Baltimore County. Supporting

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1 him tonight is his wife, Kia, daughter Harrison
 2 who a BCPS student, and mother, Gwen Wheatley.
 3 Congratulations. (Applause.)
 4 Kathleen Kilbaugh, assistant principal at
 5 Bear Creek Elementary School. She has 10 years
 6 of service in Baltimore County and supporting her
 7 tonight are the following. Her husband, Tom and
 8 principal Matt Koerner from Bear Creek Elementary
 9 School.
 10 Next, we have Barry King. Welcome, Barry
 11 to Baltimore County. He's new to Baltimore
 12 County. Supporting him, or not, from a distance,
 13 his family vacationing in Ocean City. Welcome,
 14 Barry. (Applause.)
 15 Kristin Loscomb, assistant principal at
 16 Scott's Branch Elementary School. She has 16.5
 17 years of experience in Baltimore County.
 18 Supporting her tonight are her husband, Mark and
 19 principal Lauren Tilghman from Scott's Branch
 20 Elementary School. Congratulations. (Applause.)
 21 James Marth, assistant principal

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1 Featherbed Lane Elementary School. Fifteen years
 2 of service in Baltimore County. Supporting him
 3 tonight is his wife, Allison Marth. (Applause.)
 4 Next, we have Vincent Piscopo, assistant
 5 principal at Stemmer's Run Middle School. Twelve
 6 years of service in Baltimore County. Supporting
 7 him tonight is his wife, Carla Piscopo.
 8 Congratulations. (Applause.)
 9 Next, we have Brian Powell, the assistant
 10 principal at Eastern Technical High School.
 11 Welcome to Baltimore County. Supporting him
 12 tonight is his wife, Joanna, and principal,
 13 Michelle Anderson who is the principal of Eastern
 14 Technical High School. (Applause.)
 15 Next, we have Erin Ray, Assistant
 16 principal at Kenwood High School. She brings 18
 17 years of service in Baltimore County. Supporting
 18 her tonight are her mother, Patricia and
 19 principal, Brian Powell at Kenwood High School.
 20 (Applause.)
 21 Next, we have Philip Robertson, principal

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1 at Meadowwood Education Center. He has 14 years
 2 of service in Baltimore County. Supporting him
 3 tonight is his wife, Grace. (Applause.)
 4 Next, we have Anthony Schultz, the
 5 assistant principal at Westtown Elementary
 6 School. He has 10 years of service in Baltimore
 7 County and supporting him tonight are the
 8 following. His wife, Anna Fitzgibbon, father and
 9 mother, David and Maureen Schultz, sister Anna
 10 Grace-Bennett, brother-in-law Jeff Bennett,
 11 mother-in-law and father-in-law, Chuck and
 12 Jeanine Fitzgibbon. (Applause.)
 13 Next, we have John Supek, the senior
 14 operations supervisor. Welcome to Baltimore
 15 County Public Schools. Supporting John tonight
 16 is his wife, Heather. (Applause.)
 17 Next, we have Alana Thompson, assistant
 18 principal at Woodholme Elementary School with 7
 19 years of experience in Baltimore County.
 20 Supporting her tonight is her husband, William,
 21 stepson Joseph and stepson's friend, Erin

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1 Hippalite. Congratulations. (Applause.)
 2 Next, we have Michelle Webster, principal
 3 of Featherbed Lane Elementary School. She brings
 4 24 years of service in Baltimore County.
 5 Supporting her tonight are the following. Her
 6 husband, Jeff, sons Tyler and Brendan and
 7 assistant principal, Maria Ramos from Hillcrest
 8 Elementary School. Congratulations. (Applause.)
 9 Last but not least, Jody Wicks,
 10 supervisor of Language Arts, Secondary Office of
 11 English. She brings 16 years of service in
 12 Baltimore County. Supporting her tonight are the
 13 following. Her husband, Andrew, her son Drew,
 14 mother Joanne Fleming, coordinator Gail Green
 15 from the Office of Secondary English Language
 16 Arts, and interim Director of Academics, Megan
 17 Shay, Department of Academics. (Applause.)
 18 Congratulations to each and every one of
 19 you. I first would like to thank the community
 20 superintendents, the cabinet and, particularly,
 21 HR. This is a lot of work in terms of the process

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1 in filling these vacancies. I just want to say
 2 thank you, I commend you of all your work and to
 3 the new appointees, congratulations. You did it.
 4 (Applause.)
 5 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you very much,
 6 everyone, and congratulations. I believe they're
 7 going to do photos out in the hallway or in the
 8 overflow room. Mr. Neusbaum, our next item is
 9 New Business, Actions Taken in Closed Session.
 10 As usual, Mr. Neusbaum clears the room.
 11 MR. NEUSBAUM: It's my job.
 12 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: We'll take just a
 13 moment while the room clears. Mr. Neusbaum?
 14 MR. NEUSBAUM: Earlier this evening, the
 15 Board considered 6 appeals regarding confidential
 16 student matters in your quasi-judicial capacity.
 17 All 6 were considered on the record. At this
 18 time, it would be appropriate to confirm the
 19 actions taken in those matters in closed session.
 20 They are summary affirmances 19-29, 19-35, 19-56,
 21 19-59, 19-61 and J-R.

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1 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Do I have a motion
 2 to approve the actions taken in closed session?
 3 MS. MACK: So moved.
 4 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Ms. Mack.
 5 Do I have a second?
 6 MR. OFFERMAN: Second.
 7 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Mr.
 8 Offerman. Is there any discussion? Hearing
 9 none, all in favor, please raise your hand. Any
 10 opposed? Thank you, Mr. Neusbaum.
 11 MR. NEUSBAUM: Thank you. The order is,
 12 rather than pass them around tonight, there are 6
 13 of them. They're on the table so you can find
 14 them later on.
 15 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Our next
 16 item is Item M, New Business, Contract Awards.
 17 For that, I call on committee Chair, Ms. Henn.
 18 VICE CHAIR HENN: Thank you, Madame
 19 Chair. Members of the Board, the Board's
 20 Building and Contracts Committee met earlier this
 21 evening. Items M1 through M15 are being

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1 forwarded to the full Board for approval.
 2 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Do I have a motion
 3 to approve items M1 through M15?
 4 VOICE: So moved.
 5 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: No second is needed
 6 since the recommendation comes from the
 7 committee. Board members, is there any
 8 discussion on any of the contracts? Hearing no
 9 questions, all in favor, please raise your hand?
 10 Any opposed? The motion carries unanimously.
 11 Thank you, Ms. Henn. I appreciate the work of
 12 the Building and Contracts Committee and all of
 13 the staff. That meeting was held earlier and it
 14 is available on our website under committees, the
 15 video, if anyone wants to go back and watch the
 16 full discussion that was had there.
 17 Our next item is Item N, New Business,
 18 Report on Policies. I wanted to present members
 19 of the Board, the Policy Review Committee asks
 20 that the Board accept this report of the
 21 committee's approved proposed changes to the

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1 following Board policies. This is what we call
 2 first reader.
 3 Policy 3710, Safety and Security
 4 Equipment, Policy 4102, Sexual Harassment, Policy
 5 4201, Employee Insurance Benefits, Policy 5320,
 6 Student Organizations and Clubs. These
 7 recommendations are presented to you on tonight's
 8 agenda as Exhibit N. Do I have a motion to adopt
 9 the recommendation of the Board's Policy Review
 10 Committee?
 11 MS. MACK: So moved.
 12 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Ms. Mack.
 13 No second is needed since the recommendation
 14 comes from the committee. All in favor, please
 15 raise your hand. Any opposed? Motion carries
 16 unanimously. To let the public know, these
 17 policies will be coming up at a future Board
 18 meeting and the public will be able to comment on
 19 the policies at that time.
 20 The next item of business is Item O, New
 21 Business, Report on Watershed Public Charter

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1 School. For that, I call forward Dr. McComas and
 2 Dr. Adams to come forward and present their
 3 update. Following the presentation, we will have
 4 time for discussion if the Board so desires.
 5 Good evening, Dr. McComas and Dr. Adams.
 6 MR. MCCOMAS: Good evening, Dr. Williams
 7 and Chair Causey and Chair Henn and members of
 8 the Board. Dr. Adams and myself are here tonight
 9 to bring forward an update on the opening process
 10 to support Watershed Public Charter School.
 11 What you see before you tonight on this
 12 slide is really airing our outcome for this
 13 evening which I mentioned is to provide an
 14 informational update. We know our Board likes
 15 frequent updates and that's what we are in the
 16 process of doing. I think our last one was in
 17 May.
 18 Our next slide, just to center everyone
 19 in the work, what you have here is a map of
 20 Baltimore County schools. The red dots identify
 21 student who are on a wait list, the blue dots

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1 identify students who have been accepted to
 2 Watershed. You can see that the spread of
 3 students really does fan out around the full
 4 county and, therefore, as a result of the wide
 5 spread, we don't have any singular Baltimore
 6 County school that draws so many students that it
 7 affects staffing at any of their other schools.
 8 In terms of the informational updates, as
 9 I said before, our last Board update was provided
 10 in May and, at that time, we brought you an
 11 update as to where curriculum and development was
 12 at that time and facilities at that time.
 13 Tonight, our update will focus on facilities as
 14 they are currently, informational technology and
 15 student enrollment.
 16 DR. ADAMS: Good evening. With the
 17 facilities status as of July, you may remember
 18 that BCPS and Watershed, we've been communicating
 19 about the facility, specifically, we had
 20 mentioned in May that the health suite was one of
 21 the sole remaining issues regarding facility

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1 suitability and I also wanted to remind the Board
 2 that the facility must be deemed suitable for
 3 instruction by BCPS in order for the school to
 4 open.
 5 Based on our current understanding and a
 6 recent visit, permits have been accepted and
 7 renovations are underway. The health suite was a
 8 remaining area of concern. On June 2nd, 2019,
 9 Watershed provided responses to our feedback on
 10 their construction plans.
 11 BCPS then responded to Watershed on June
 12 13th stating that the school's proposed solution
 13 to the health suite requirement was not
 14 acceptable. Watershed proposed provided a
 15 sound-reducing curtain in order to create the
 16 required private consultation space. This
 17 solution is not in accordance with COMAR which
 18 requires a separate room for private consultation
 19 and for use as a designated school health
 20 services professional's offices. Watershed was
 21 notified that the health suite needed to be

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1 renovated to meet the requirements of state law.
 2 On June 22nd, following a meeting that
 3 included BCPS staff, Watershed leadership and
 4 MSDE, MSDE informed Watershed and BCPS that,
 5 despite system concerns, MSDE would be waiving
 6 the requirement for a private consultation space.
 7 So, with that requirement waived, only
 8 discussions around food, nutrition and kitchen
 9 equipment remain.
 10 BCPS staff and health department staff
 11 from Baltimore County have a final inspection and
 12 my records say that that is scheduled for July
 13 10th. So, within the next week, we have a health
 14 inspection on the kitchen.
 15 In terms of information technology, I
 16 wanted to share an update on BCPS and Watershed
 17 discussions. At this time, Watershed has decided
 18 that the school will not use the BCPS wide area
 19 network or our internet connections and fiber.
 20 Our wide area network and fiber provide a number
 21 of services and support and this decision has

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1 several implications.
 2 This decision has the following
 3 ramifications that potentially impact employee
 4 efficiencies, student and staff safety, privacy
 5 of data and possibly instruction. Our security
 6 cameras, door buzzer system and payroll system
 7 for non-exempt employees are all predicated on
 8 the use of our network and fiber.
 9 Therefore, Watershed will not use our
 10 camera system. They have agreed to use the same
 11 camera company and system but integration between
 12 their system and ours is not guaranteed. It is
 13 something we're working on. Because Watershed
 14 will not be on our network, the school will not
 15 have a secure connection to the Department of
 16 Safety or the Baltimore County police department
 17 for emergency response.
 18 In addition, they will have their own
 19 unique door buzzer and entry system. As you know
 20 in BCPS, we use a one-card system that grants
 21 staff access to buildings based on their role and

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1 ID badge. For example, our safety managers have
 2 access to all the schools in their area with just
 3 a single ID.
 4 Watershed's safety manager will have to
 5 have two door swipes, as will the community
 6 superintendent and the Executive Director of
 7 School Support.
 8 Additionally, since they will not be on
 9 our network, payroll, time and attendance for
 10 non-exempt employees will have to manually
 11 tracked, submitted and processed. We anticipate
 12 for the first year that this will affect three
 13 staff members at Watershed Public Charter School.
 14 Without access to our network and fiber,
 15 active directory support for student and staff
 16 accounts cannot be provided. Active directory
 17 support is the system by which we use unique
 18 staff and student IDs to provide both with access
 19 to required systems.
 20 In layman's terms, I'm RAdams in our
 21 system and when I log into my device and BCPS One

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1 based on my role and my permissions, the system
 2 allows me to go and see and do what I'm expected
 3 to do and doesn't allow me to go someplace that
 4 I'm not.
 5 Without this, the other thing that active
 6 directory support does is it allows us to roster
 7 teachers and students to curricular materials and
 8 resources within the learning management system.
 9 So, for example, the Wanderers reading resources
 10 are rostered to students through their
 11 connections to a homeroom teacher.
 12 So, without that active directory
 13 support, students and staff will not have access
 14 to digital curricular resources. In addition,
 15 teachers will have to connect to the BCPS system
 16 using our virtual private network in order to
 17 access the systems that live behind our firewall.
 18 An example of such would be in order to
 19 take daily attendance, students have to access
 20 the student information system but the student
 21 information system lives behind our firewall.

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1 So, with Watershed teachers not on our network
 2 and our fiber, they would have to log into our
 3 virtual private network in order to take
 4 attendance.
 5 One of the other reasons that they would
 6 need to do this is any required password changes.
 7 So, our system requires us to change our password
 8 at a particular frequency. In order to do that
 9 you had to be connected to the network.
 10 Lastly, this decision to not use our wide
 11 area network and fiber means that Watershed would
 12 need to identify its own internet filtering
 13 system for K-12 students and also have in place a
 14 firewall system to protect student and staff data
 15 as both are required.
 16 Finally, I wanted to provide an update on
 17 student enrollment at the charter school. Dr.
 18 McComas shared with you the map of accepted and
 19 wait listed students and I know that, based on
 20 recent conversations with Principal Jayman, that
 21 there is a longer wait list now than there was

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1 originally.

2 Charter school funding is provided by

3 BCPS and is dependent on that enrollment and, as

4 you know, MSDE requires us to provide an official

5 enrollment count by school each September. So,

6 as a reminder to the Board, Watershed has a

7 target enrollment of 176 students. That

8 enrollment ensures approximately \$2 million in

9 BCPS funding which supports their 17 and a half

10 FTE and anything left over could be used for

11 educational programming.

12 I have an update. When my Windows

13 presentation was uploaded into Board Docs, their

14 enrollment was 123. As of this morning, the

15 enrollment is 129 of the 176 accepted students.

16 Based on the information we have about

17 their budget, Watershed has very little margin of

18 error should their September enrollment not reach

19 their target of 176 students. Meaningful

20 under-enrollment may impair their operations and

21 provisions of the educational program.

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1 Therefore, we continue to encourage leadership at

2 the school to efficiently verify and enroll

3 accepted students into their program in order to

4 support the educational program as intended.

5 This concludes our summary of where we

6 are with opening the school. We continue to work

7 with them and support them. Not even quite two

8 weeks ago, we had our latest school opening

9 meeting with Watershed and we have additional

10 meetings scheduled. Just yesterday, as you know,

11 we received additional written feedback from

12 them.

13 We wish them to be successful and we will

14 continue to provide appropriate levels of

15 support. With that, Dr. McComas and I are

16 prepared to take any questions you might have.

17 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Dr.

18 Adams. Ms. Mack, I saw your hand go up earlier.

19 Then, we'll work around to other Board members.

20 MS. MACK: Hi, Dr. Adams. Thank you.

21 You referenced an email that Watershed staff, I

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1 mean, a letter that they sent yesterday that

2 refutes quite a bit of what you said. I don't

3 know if you want to take the time to go

4 point-by-point but I think some of it is very

5 important.

6 DR. ADAMS: If that would be the Board's

7 desire. I have a copy of the letter. I can

8 certain speak to things in the letter that I, I

9 know it was referenced in the letter quite a bit,

10 that I spoke to myself and there are some other

11 components that would probably be more

12 appropriate for Mr. Dixit to speak to.

13 I know there was concern that I said that

14 there isn't a violation of curriculum and that

15 there isn't enough curriculum. My response to

16 that is both of those statements are true. There

17 is not a violation of the master agreement

18 because when we met with Ms. Beytin and Mr.

19 Gallante, they agreed that since teachers could

20 not have the curriculum until they met with the

21 principal and were interviewed and hired and we

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1 didn't have a principal in place at the beginning

2 of the fourth marking period, that it would be

3 most appropriate for the teachers to not receive

4 the curriculum until they were accepted and had

5 agreed to transfer to the school.

6 At the same time, Ms. Shay and I have had

7 multiple meetings with Watershed about curriculum

8 dating back to last December as we've detailed in

9 weekly updates and previous communication to the

10 Board. During those meetings, including a

11 meeting with Ms. Beytin and Mr. Gallante, we

12 explained how our curriculum is designed, what

13 are those particular components and what I have

14 shared is I said, and what I've shared publicly I

15 would repeat today, what I have seen is not what

16 I believe our teachers are used to as a staff

17 member who sits across the table when there are

18 teacher grievances.

19 What Ms. Shay actually said at the last

20 meeting, if I could quote her, she said, "I

21 wouldn't be able to get away with this if I were

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 86</p> <p>1 rolling out this curriculum.”</p> <p>2 So, the idea that there isn't a violation</p> <p>3 of the master agreement and the fact that I feel</p> <p>4 that the curriculum doesn't meet what our</p> <p>5 teachers are typically used to are both factual</p> <p>6 and true. What Ms. Shay and I also shared was,</p> <p>7 but you've got a limited number of teachers. MACK: I mean, just some of the</p> <p>3 statements under the use of their camera system.</p> <p>4 Is it not true that even though they're not using</p> <p>5 the same brand of door entry system, that they</p> <p>6 will make cards available to staff who require</p> <p>7 entry into the building?</p> <p>8 DR. ADAMS: They will. That's what my</p> <p>9 statement said in that those staff who would need</p> <p>10 entry to the system would have to have two cards.</p> <p>11 Which is what they're also saying, that they are</p> <p>12 going to make a card available to the safety</p> <p>13 manager, to the community superintendent, to the</p> <p>14 Executive Director.</p> <p>15 Initially, they were discussions and they</p> <p>16 were asking us for specifications around how to</p> <p>17 integrate their camera system into our camera</p> <p>18 system and we could not provide those</p> <p>19 specifications because that's not something that</p> <p>20 we operationally do. So, those specifications</p> <p>21 don't exist because we've not done business in</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 87</p> <p>1 met with them several times just generally on</p> <p>2 curriculum and then each curricular content</p> <p>3 office spent a meeting with them going into the</p> <p>4 curriculum. In fact, in one of our meetings,</p> <p>5 once they had access to BCPS One and they could</p> <p>6 look at all of our curriculum, I said, well,</p> <p>7 since you have a program that is heavily</p> <p>8 integrated with science, look at our science</p> <p>9 curriculum. Our teachers, to my knowledge, have</p> <p>10 never really complained about our elementary</p> <p>11 science curriculum, so use that as a model. So,</p> <p>12 I would say that we have provided much feedback</p> <p>13 around the curriculum.</p> <p>14 MS. MACK: My comments were not about the</p> <p>15 curriculum. But, thank you for that.</p> <p>16 DR. ADAMS: Oh, I'm sorry. That was the</p> <p>17 one that came to mind most readily. But, if</p> <p>18 there's a particular portion of the letter, Ms.</p> <p>19 Mack, that you would want me to address, I'm</p> <p>20 certainly happy to do so. As long as it doesn't</p> <p>21 deal with the facility, then Mr. Dixit would need</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 89</p> <p>1 that way before.</p> <p>2 What Mr. Corns did offer was to explore</p> <p>3 how we might be able to integrate that. But,</p> <p>4 going back to early school opening meetings as</p> <p>5 early as February, one of the things we talked</p> <p>6 about, knowing the work of our Department of</p> <p>7 Information Technology and how many things we</p> <p>8 have to integrate, we expressed concern that the</p> <p>9 timeline was very tight for integration to</p> <p>10 happen. So, that's why my statements tonight</p> <p>11 said integration may not be possible because I do</p> <p>12 not know if it is possible to do that before the</p> <p>13 start of the school year.</p> <p>14 MS. MACK: But, they will have a secure</p> <p>15 building that can only be access by some type of</p> <p>16 card. Is that a true statement?</p> <p>17 DR. ADAMS: That is what they say they</p> <p>18 will do.</p> <p>19 DR. MCCOMAS: Let me just clarify. Part</p> <p>20 of our role is not just to shepherd the opening</p> <p>21 of this school and to make sure that it is</p>

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1 shepherded to the rigor that we open our own
 2 schools. But, to also make sure that all of you
 3 are well aware and understand implications of
 4 where there are differences. So, when there is
 5 an implication that the security is not
 6 accessible through our video, if I'm describing
 7 that correctly, it's important that you
 8 understand that.

9 Are we saying that that stops the opening
 10 of the school? No. But, you, as leaders in this
 11 community, need to be aware of where those
 12 differences are and what those implications are.
 13 So, that is part of our role, to shepherd all of
 14 you in your thorough understanding, as well as
 15 shepherd Watershed in the school opening process.

16 DR. ADAMS: For example, Baltimore County
 17 Police Department can look at our cameras at our
 18 school because they're all on one system. I was
 19 at a school at the end of the school year and an
 20 incident happened and Dr. Ford was there probably
 21 10 minutes later because he has a direct line, he

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1 can see the cameras and he was close by.

2 So, without integration or using the same
 3 system, Dr. Ford or an officer or a resource
 4 officer assigned to those area elementary schools
 5 would have to toggle back and forth between those
 6 systems which takes a little bit more time and I
 7 think we would all agree that, in an emergency
 8 response, every second counts.

9 So, that's just something, again, like
 10 Dr. McComas said, we want you to be aware of what
 11 the implications of the decisions are.

12 MS. MACK: Okay. Thank you, Dr. McComas,
 13 for that. I think what I find very confusing is
 14 this discussion about enrollment. I think you
 15 updated the 123 to 129.

16 DR. ADAMS: Uh-huh (affirmative).

17 MS. MACK: My question is how can we only
 18 have 129 students enrolled when we have 409
 19 students that have applied and we have a waiting
 20 list. So, how can we have a waiting list when we
 21 haven't filled every available seat?

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1 DR. ADAMS: That is a great question.
 2 So, if I could use a different example and think
 3 about our magnet programs. My son, who is a
 4 recent graduate, applied to several magnet
 5 programs and was accepted into several magnet
 6 programs. So, at one point, each of those high
 7 school programs believed my son was coming to
 8 their school.

9 He only went to the school that we went
 10 to and said this is definitely the one that he's
 11 coming to which was Western. With enrollment, if
 12 I'm the parent and my son or daughter has been
 13 accepted as a seat, I still need to bring all of
 14 my paperwork to the school and then the principal
 15 or the admin secretary then completes the
 16 enrollment within the system.

17 So, I can't theorize. My theory would be
 18 that you have parents who have accepted seats but
 19 they have not brought their paperwork to the
 20 school to then allow Principal Jayman or their
 21 admin secretary to enroll the student into the

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1 system which would then put that student into
 2 their bucket.

3 MS. MACK: Is there an issue where
 4 students are being unenrolled from the SIS
 5 system?

6 DR. ADAMS: So, what we found was there
 7 was a day of glitches where it appeared one or
 8 two students, this did come up in the last school
 9 opening meeting, it appeared as if one or two
 10 students somehow were unenrolled. Since our
 11 enrollment rolled over on July 1st, we have not
 12 been able to replicate that glitch. When I first
 13 heard of it which was before the school opening
 14 meeting, I contacted someone in Mr. Corns' shop.
 15 That person was able to show me that at that time
 16 they had an enrollment of 120 and then there were
 17 9 pending enrollments that had been started in
 18 the system but weren't complete.

19 So, that concern was heard. It was
 20 verified as a glitch and I believe Mr. Corns'
 21 team believes that they have resolved that.

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1 So, I'm cannot unenroll a student, if I'm
 2 at Featherbed, I cannot unenroll a student from
 3 Watershed at this point.
 4 MS. MACK: So, I guess I'm still
 5 confused. If Watershed says they have 409
 6 students and 119 students on their waiting list,
 7 that would presume that they know that they're
 8 going to fill all 176 seats.
 9 DR. MCCOMAS: If I may, Ms. Mack, until
 10 the paperwork is in, it's an intent to enroll.
 11 But, until that paperwork is complete, it's not
 12 complete and we are giving you frequent updates
 13 as that paperwork is complete.
 14 Are we here saying that rest of those
 15 enrollments won't occur? No. But, we are giving
 16 you, in real time, what the enrollment is to date
 17 based on completed paperwork.
 18 MS. MACK: Okay. Just my final question.
 19 Is there anything in this presentation at this
 20 point in time that would present Watershed from
 21 opening on September 3rd when the rest of BCPS

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1 schools open?
 2 DR. ADAMS: In this presentation, I would
 3 say no. Not in this presentation. No, ma'am.
 4 MS. MACK: Okay. Thank you very much.
 5 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: (Inaudible.
 6 Speaking away from microphone.)
 7 VICE CHAIR HENN: Thank you. You can
 8 guess my questions are around the IT decisions
 9 that were made.
 10 DR. ADAMS: I guess I'm going to need Mr.
 11 Corns to come up here and sit with us.
 12 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Mr. Corns?
 13 VICE CHAIR HENN: Hi, Mr. Corns. Good
 14 evening. My first questions were around why the
 15 decisions were made not to go with BCPS's fiber
 16 or wide area network. If you can speak to that?
 17 MR. CORNS: I can only speak to what I
 18 believe is the case. In a meeting that Dr. Adams
 19 and I had with Watershed and their leadership,
 20 there was a conversation around the cost of the
 21 fiber to put in the ground and I believe, correct

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1 me if I'm wrong, the belief that the building is
 2 not a permanent fixture. I think a three-year
 3 timeline was put in place that the price of the
 4 fiber would exceed their expectation for the
 5 return on investment for three years.
 6 VICE CHAIR HENN: Okay. Makes sense as a
 7 temporary solution. What alternative are they
 8 going to use for connectivity?
 9 MR. CORNS: I believe FiOS. Yeah, FiOS.
 10 VICE CHAIR HENN: FiOS will be used?
 11 And, it was my understanding that all curriculum
 12 resources are available outside of the network.
 13 Students access them at home. They're not on a
 14 network that wasn't an issue. Maybe I misheard
 15 you, Dr. Adams. Are there particular resources
 16 that are only available
 17 DR. ADAMS: Right. There are things that
 18 are rostered to students through teachers,
 19 through the network. There are also things that
 20 are more openly available and that you don't have
 21 to be on the network to access them. But,

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1 students still get them through BCPS One so their
 2 unique ID is still being passed through to our
 3 systems.
 4 VICE CHAIR HENN: Through active
 5 directory.
 6 MR. CORNS: Yes, ma'am.
 7 VICE CHAIR HENN: Okay. I'm trying to
 8 understand the implications. Again, as Dr.
 9 McComas was saying, shepherding our understanding
 10 to say how is this going to be different in terms
 11 of the impact on students because that's why
 12 we're all here.
 13 MR. CORNS: And, they intend to use their
 14 own curriculum so that may not be something
 15 that's a big deal. However, if there's something
 16 that a teacher wanted to use, as a supplement, as
 17 a resource, he or she may not be able to use it.
 18 I think that's important for teachers to
 19 understand. They may be used to certain
 20 curricular materials and even if we're doing an
 21 integrated approach, there might be a resource

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1 over here that they'd like to pull in to
 2 supplement that instruction and they may not be
 3 able to do that.

4 VICE CHAIR HENN: Right. The other
 5 concern is, depending on the speed, if they're
 6 using FiOS or whatever, VPN tends to affect
 7 performance. So, then you said they'd have to
 8 access this through VPN, I kind of cringe because
 9 I know that that can affect performance and
 10 that's the last thing we want with testing and
 11 some other effects that that can have on
 12 students. So, that is a concern.

13 MR. CORNS: Only the staff would be
 14 utilizing the VPN. The students would be driving
 15 through I believe Watershed's intention is to
 16 utilize Chromebooks with a Google Apps for
 17 Education environment that they would be in
 18 control and maintenance of. I believe, at last,
 19 we were talking that there was work being done to
 20 have that environment set up. That would
 21 replicate our elementary model that we're

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1 currently using in BCPS as well in a separate
 2 environment.

3 But, the most recent occurrence that
 4 we've got is an order to alleviate some of the
 5 need for consistent VPN connection. We're going
 6 to be able to put a light-duty point-to-point
 7 wireless access point in the front office which
 8 will allow the secretary, who is going to need to
 9 be on the SIS basically all day, to have access
 10 to that.

11 So, when we talk about what this looks
 12 like, this is the only school in BCPS that will
 13 be set up this way. So, that will be a little
 14 bit of uncharted territory.

15 So, some of the bits that we need to work
 16 out is the VPN tunnel. Are we going to do split
 17 traffic or are we going to run everything through
 18 that tunnel? If we run everything through that
 19 tunnel, then it cuts off local access to all the
 20 resources. But, if we do split traffic, is it
 21 going to route the right way? So, there's just

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1 some unknowns that we're working through.

2 As Dr. McComas and Dr. Adams were both
 3 saying, I don't see anything in here that's going
 4 to stop this progress. We just need to be
 5 cognizant of the fact that, of the schools we
 6 have set up, this will be the one that is an
 7 outlier.

8 VICE CHAIR HENN: All right. Will your
 9 team be reviewing the filtering that is in place
 10 for access?

11 MR. CORNS: Not necessarily.

12 VICE CHAIR HENN: Okay. Does that give
 13 you any pause or concern in terms of what content
 14 students will be able to access?

15 MR. CORNS: So, when it comes down to
 16 content, we always will address directly to
 17 parents, what the parent concern is. I can speak
 18 only locally and immediately that we deal with a
 19 lot of internal calls about what a parent may
 20 deem as appropriate or inappropriate content.
 21 You and I have had conversations through meetings

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1 as well.

2 So, I think with the confidence I'd have
 3 to put in, when we say SIPPA requirements, they
 4 are all centered around obscene and pornographic
 5 images. That is the federal law. That is the
 6 floor of what we filter.

7 Now, we can dialogue about what that
 8 means. If I only set our filter to obscene and
 9 pornographic images, the content that would be
 10 above and beyond that would be not appropriate.

11 The belief that I have around Watershed's
 12 capabilities of doing that, I don't know that I
 13 can say one way or the other whether or not they
 14 will be able to filter in a way that would make
 15 their parents comfortable. But, I believe that
 16 would be a conversation between the school and
 17 the parents in this scenario.

18 VICE CHAIR HENN: But, in terms of an
 19 equivalency. Are we saying that there's going to
 20 be something that gives us as a Board comfort
 21 that our kids have a level of protection that we

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<p>1 are comfortable with? In terms of internet 2 filtering.</p> <p>3 MR. CORNS: I can't speak to the 4 filtering solution that Watershed plans to use. 5 I don't know that answer.</p> <p>6 VICE CHAIR HENN: They're not using ours. 7 Are they using something that we're comfortable 8 with?</p> <p>9 MR. CORNS: I don't know what they're 10 planning to use.</p> <p>11 DR. MCCOMAS: Vice Chair Henn, let me 12 just interject. One of the things, and I think 13 you already know from the letter you received 14 from Watershed, is we were planning for Watershed 15 to come forward with Dr. Jones because, at this 16 point, we will continue to help shepherd the 17 systemic start-up of a school but as we move 18 closer and closer to the start of the school 19 year, certainly the community superintendent and 20 the principal and, I presume, probably the 21 Executive Director, Ms. Jessi Leason, will</p>	<p>1 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Dr. Williams and I, 2 if it's okay with staff, if you want to come 3 forward if you're prepared to answer some 4 questions?</p> <p>5 MR. MCMILLION: They can stay there. 6 Just to brief questions I have for them.</p> <p>7 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: They have to come 8 forward to speak into the microphone. If we need 9 to have follow-up time for answers, that's okay 10 as well. Mr. McMillion?</p> <p>11 MR. MCMILLION: It's just two simple 12 questions. Thank you very much for allowing me 13 to ask. Are you in agreement with the 129 14 enrollment numbers that were presented today?</p> <p>15 VOICE: No. Would you like more?</p> <p>16 MR. MCMILLION: That brings me to the 17 other question. What numbers do you have?</p> <p>18 VOICE: My number is, I think, 153. 19 There's a couple of problems. Students have been 20 unenrolled. My own son was unenrolled today. It 21 was not a one-day problem.</p>
<p>Page 103</p> <p>1 present on August 6th when we are bringing that 2 forward as an opportunity for them to continue to 3 update you. We're doing 3 it but SIS has been offline for a week for 4 maintenance. So, we just got access again today.</p> <p>5 MR. MCMILLION: Okay. My second question 6 is do you project you're going to start school on 7 Tuesday, September 3rd with everybody else?</p> <p>8 VOICE: Yes.</p> <p>9 MR. MCMILLION: Thank you.</p> <p>10 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. I 11 appreciate, staff and I appreciate everyone's 12 work on this issue and I understand also that it 13 is a new situation for most of us on the Board. 14 We haven't had a charter school. So, we 15 appreciate everyone's flexibility in working 16 through issues as we navigate something that's 17 new.</p> <p>18 So, we appreciate the updates and we do 19 have additional questions that we're going to 20 ask. We do have time. We're actually running 21 right on time for our meeting schedule. Mr.</p>

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1 Keuhne, I believe you were next.
 2 MR. KEUHNE: I'm going to pass. Thank
 3 you.
 4 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Next is Ms. Rowe.
 5 MS. ROWE: Maybe you covered this
 6 already. Are they going to be using our Raptor
 7 system and our volunteer training and all of the
 8 other things that we do to ensure security for
 9 students in our facilities?
 10 MR. CORNS: Mr. Burke says yes on Raptor.
 11 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Are there additional
 12 questions? I did want to invite Mr. Dixit to
 13 answer the question related to MSDE waiving the
 14 issue related to the health suite.
 15 MR. DIXIT: Good evening, again. One
 16 thing I have to compliment them is for moving
 17 fast. The speed at which they are working in
 18 terms of renovation is quite impressive.
 19 There are two items that were of concern
 20 to us. Number one was the privacy issue with the
 21 health suite. What we have been asked to comply

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1 with COMAR is to have a separate private space
 2 for examination and a separate space for
 3 conversation. For consultation.
 4 This building does not have that. But,
 5 in talking to state architects, they are willing
 6 to waive that requirement.
 7 Now, I just want the Board to know that
 8 this is not the way we do our buildings. So,
 9 that's one issue. The second issue was the
 10 equipment size for the kitchen. They are working
 11 actively on this and, from what I've been
 12 informed, they intend to comply with that
 13 requirement. But, it's not complete as of today.
 14 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Okay. Thank you.
 15 So, we appreciate that. Is that something that
 16 the approval, you have that in writing from the
 17 state architect or something that will be
 18 obtained?
 19 MR. DIXIT: We have verbal approval from
 20 the state architect and we are waiting for the
 21 written approval.

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1 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Okay, great. Any
 2 other questions or comments from Board members?
 3 Dr. Williams?
 4 DR. WILLIAMS: I just want to make a
 5 quick comment. The senior cabinet has shared
 6 this information with me and we talked about, Dr.
 7 McComas mentioned that we found it necessary, at
 8 the upcoming Board meeting, that we have
 9 representatives from Watershed in our office to
 10 show the collaboration, to hear the next steps in
 11 terms of the opening.
 12 So, that's why we allowed the questions
 13 to be answered. But, I really think the next
 14 step is so you can hear from both the schools'
 15 staff leadership and the central office
 16 leadership about the work as a symbol of the
 17 collaboration and to discuss the work that has
 18 been address and those items that are causing
 19 questions and how best we could answer. So, I
 20 believe the next meeting is in August. So, we're
 21 looking forward to that presentation.

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1 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Could I ask you,
 2 would it be appropriate to have Board members
 3 submit questions regarding this and then have a
 4 weekly update since we don't have another meeting
 5 for four weeks and things are happening every
 6 week, apparently.
 7 DR. MCCOMAS: Yes, things happen every
 8 day.
 9 DR. WILLIAMS: We welcome that. Yes.
 10 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Okay. All right.
 11 Thank you. Thank you very much. We appreciate
 12 that. The next item on our agenda is Item P,
 13 Board Member Comments. For that, we're just
 14 going to start and go around the room. Ms. Rowe,
 15 we'll start with you this time.
 16 MS. ROWE: I hope everyone is having a
 17 very good summer. I see lots of kids on the
 18 playgrounds and I'm very happy that we have a new
 19 basketball court at Loch Raven Technical Academy
 20 and Hillcrest Elementary School and now the Loch
 21 Raven Rec Council also has a new basketball court

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1 because we have a community volunteer who has
 2 been putting them in.
 3 I also attended the safe schools
 4 conference. For anyone who did not attend that,
 5 you really missed out. For years, I've been
 6 talking about trauma and trauma-informed
 7 practices and that was the entire focus of the
 8 whole thing and it was really fantastic. I'm
 9 really happy that, as a school system, we're
 10 addressing the experiences that children have
 11 that cause them to come into the classroom
 12 unavailable to learn and that because of these
 13 different techniques that these people in our
 14 school system are actively learning about and
 15 teaching others about, we can help these children
 16 in ways that are not complicated or difficult to
 17 learn. It really does make all the difference in
 18 the world.
 19 I had a lot of trauma in my upbringing
 20 and I had a 3rd grade teacher and she made the
 21 difference. She was a mandatory reporter. She

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1 went to court to fight for me and she brushed my
 2 hair every day. She made sure that other kids
 3 didn't pick on me, that they understood that it's
 4 okay to be different and everyone has different
 5 experiences.
 6 For that one teacher, to make a
 7 difference in my life, it mattered. It mattered
 8 a lot. It made a difference between my outcome
 9 today and what my outcome could have been and
 10 what the outcome of some of my peers in similar
 11 situations is very different.
 12 So, I would like to encourage every
 13 teacher in our school system that when you have
 14 that difficult child who does things that don't
 15 make sense to you, just remember that just being
 16 kind, just trying to understand and a little bit
 17 of patience can make the difference in that
 18 child's entire outcome for their entire life and
 19 one person really can make that kind of
 20 difference in another person's life.
 21 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Ms.

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1 Scott?
 2 MS. SCOTT: Thank you. Thank you so much
 3 for that, Lily. I also attended safe schools and
 4 I found it very informative and very enlightening
 5 to learn about all of the ways that we can
 6 address and identify trauma and support our
 7 students.
 8 I would also like to echo the sentiments
 9 of the community and a lot of folks here in
 10 welcoming Omar Rashid as well as Dr. Williams to
 11 BCPS. We're very happy to have both of you here
 12 and I look forward to working together
 13 effectively to support all of our students. I'd
 14 also like to wish a happy birthday to Board
 15 member Cheryl Pasteur who is not here. She's
 16 hopefully somewhere having fun.
 17 I just hope that everyone is having a
 18 wonderful summer. I hope students are getting a
 19 lot of reading done and hopefully preventing the
 20 summer slide. So, enjoy summer and hopefully
 21 everybody is having a great summer. Thank you.

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1 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Ms. Mack.
 2 MS. MACK: I am going to try to make up
 3 for lost time and will be visiting the schools
 4 this summer that I did not visit prior to the
 5 start of summer. Next week, I will be attending
 6 or observing the curriculum-writing workshop.
 7 Finally, I would like to congratulate
 8 Western Tech's Jeremy Carlino for being one of 6
 9 Maryland finalists for the Presidential Awards
 10 for Excellence in Mathematics and Science
 11 Teaching.
 12 When I told my daughter about it, she
 13 responded that she remembers while at Sudbrook,
 14 standing on lab desks at Sudbrook reciting the
 15 quadratic equation over and over again. I don't
 16 know the lab desk part.
 17 She credits Mr. Carlino and Mr. Bullock
 18 from Western Tech for her love of math then and
 19 her love of math today. So, congratulations for
 20 Mr. Carlino.
 21 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Mr. McMillion.

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1 MR. MCMILLION: Thanks. The older I get,
 2 the quicker time flies. There are 28 days before
 3 our next Board of Education meeting on August
 4 9th. I recommend each and every one in this
 5 viewing audience, including Dr. Williams, go do
 6 something fun and challenging in the next 28
 7 days. Thank you.

8 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Ms. Henn.

9 VICE CHAIR HENN: Thank you. I want to
 10 give a shout-out to one of our very special BCPS
 11 students. His name is Andrew and he's a student
 12 at Stoneleigh Elementary.

13 In April, Andrew was diagnosed with
 14 Leukemia. He is fighting and continues to fight
 15 extremely hard every day. He's one of the
 16 toughest kiddos I know. He's my hero. I'm a
 17 proud member of Team Andrew and I would encourage
 18 you, and our kids and our system, if you have
 19 time, we want you to read and write this summer.
 20 If you're writing, please take a moment, drop him
 21 a line, he loves to receive cards and words of

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1 encouragement. You can send them here care of me
 2 at Greenwood or to PO Box 20209, Towson, 21284.
 3 Or, send them here to Greenwood and we'll make
 4 sure he gets them. Again, I know he'd really
 5 appreciate it.

6 So, Team Andrew, if you're listening,
 7 we're thinking of you. Keep fighting. You're
 8 doing great.

9 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Ms. Henn.
 10 Mr. Rashid?

11 STUDENT MEMBER RASHID: I just want to
 12 piggyback on what Lily said about teachers being
 13 not, like, defective in what one teacher can
 14 have. I know, personally, when I first came
 15 here, all my teachers were extremely supportive.
 16 They guided me through everything. It was
 17 difficult at first but they pushed me through.

18 My AP psychology teacher, Mr. Babcock.
 19 My teachers now, Ms. Pulley, Ms. Labb, Mr.
 20 Taylor, all of my teachers have been extremely
 21 supportive and I know that one teacher can make a

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1 huge difference. So, just be kind to all of our
 2 students and know that you can make a big impact
 3 in their lives. Thank you.

4 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Mr.
 5 Hayden.

6 MR. HAYDEN: Mr. McMillion almost stole
 7 word for word what I was going to say. I have to
 8 be careful. You know, in school, you're worrying
 9 about somebody's copying off of you. So, I have
 10 to check him out here to see if that happened.

11 But, the important thing is we have a
 12 good part of the summer in front of us. A lot of
 13 us have some vacation ahead. Be safe, have a
 14 good time and for those of us who have jobs and
 15 study to do and new jobs where we have to get
 16 involved in things, just keep at it. We've got a
 17 great school system and it's just going to get
 18 better. Thank you.

19 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Mr.
 20 Keuhne.

21 MR. KEUHNE: Okay. I'm going to be short

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1 and sweet. I just want to welcome the new
 2 members and the new Superintendent and wish
 3 everybody a fantastic summer and be safe and
 4 enjoy yourself.

5 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Mr.
 6 Offerman.

7 MR. OFFERMAN: Yes. I'd like to also
 8 welcome Mr. Rashid and Dr. Williams to join this
 9 group as we try to provide the best education for
 10 Baltimore County students and support for their
 11 families.

12 I'd also like to welcome, even though her
 13 official term has not begun, Ms. Serton who will
 14 be the incoming president of TABCO. She has a
 15 tremendous challenge in front of her and I'm sure
 16 she'll do a great job.

17 I'd also like to thank Ms. Beytin for the
 18 years of service. Not only has she done a great
 19 job supporting her group, her teachers, but also
 20 always in her heart were the kids of Baltimore
 21 County and that's something I'll always remember.

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1 I thank you for all of her efforts and she's
 2 certainly made this a better place and this
 3 system better for what she's given us.
 4 A final thank you to Dr. McComas and Mr.
 5 Stall and I'm going to ask Dr. McComas again to
 6 remind me the names.
 7 DR. MCCOMAS: Leann Shubert and Ryan
 8 Imrbiale.
 9 MR. OFFERMAN: Great group. I met with
 10 them Monday and we talked about the magnet
 11 program so I would be better informed of what's
 12 currently going on and plans for the future. I
 13 had a concern which the Board has dealt with
 14 previously.
 15 I was concerned there were going to be
 16 changes made so we wouldn't have the same problem
 17 occur again. But, in my thinking, with a big
 18 system like this, it takes a long time to change
 19 things.
 20 Well, I was wrong. The problem was
 21 discussed with us in January. In the time the

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1 change needed to be made for the next coming
 2 group, the changes were made and, I think, in a
 3 very effective, efficient and fair manner.
 4 Providing greater opportunity and greater
 5 equality of consideration.
 6 I mean, that's just super work and I'm
 7 very proud to be a part of that and, again, I
 8 thank them and all the staff members who have
 9 been nothing but supportive of me in my quest to
 10 learn more and do a better job. Thank you.
 11 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Mr.
 12 Offerman. The next item is Item Q, Board
 13 Committee Updates. We'll go around the room with
 14 that but, first, I wanted to invite Ms. Rowe,
 15 although it's not a Board committee, just comment
 16 briefly on the report of the legislative task
 17 force of which she is the Chair.
 18 MS. ROWE: So, the legislative task
 19 versus the anti-bullying task force. Due on July
 20 1st was the data portion and just the data
 21 portion.

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1 So, I think it was delivered to everyone.
 2 The next report is the full report and that will
 3 have Executive summaries and fulfilling the rest
 4 of the criteria of the legislative task force.
 5 Mr. Omar Rashid is going to be taking
 6 over Haleema Adekoya's place as the Vice Chair of
 7 the task force and we'll start meeting in
 8 September to fulfill the rest of those
 9 legislative requirements.
 10 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you for your
 11 work on that and we look forward to you
 12 representing the student voice as Ms. Adekoya did
 13 on that legislative task force. Thank you. Ms.
 14 Mack for the Curriculum Committee?
 15 MS. MACK: So, the Curriculum Committee
 16 has continued to meet through the summer and we
 17 were happy to add Mr. Offerman to our team. I
 18 can say that I, just like Mr. Offerman just said,
 19 appreciate Dr. McComas and her team spending so
 20 much time to date providing overviews to the
 21 curriculum committee in the various areas that

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1 increased the knowledge base of the team members.
 2 I am very encouraged that Open Court will
 3 be rolled out this fall because I continue to
 4 receive so much positive feedback about how
 5 effective it was when BCPS had it in the past and
 6 people are really looking forward to it.
 7 As I stated earlier, I'm looking forward
 8 to spending time next week observing my first
 9 curriculum-writing workshop. So, thank you
 10 again, Dr. McComas, and your team.
 11 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. Ms. Henn
 12 for Buildings and Contracts?
 13 VICE CHAIR HENN: So, the Building and
 14 Contracts Committee met earlier this evening.
 15 I'd like to thank staff for their diligence and
 16 hard work in answering all of our questions. I
 17 appreciate you putting up with us. So, thank
 18 you.
 19 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Mr. Keuhne for Audit
 20 Committee?
 21 MR. KEUHNE: The Audit Committee met last

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1 on June 18th. We discussed the fixed asset
 2 inventory update and the FY18 change in principle
 3 audit follow-up results. Thank you.
 4 BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you. And,
 5 finally, as Chair of the Policy Review Committee,
 6 I just wanted to share that we met on June 17th.
 7 The minutes of the committee's June meeting are
 8 available for viewing on the school system's
 9 website. Also, the video of the meeting is also
 10 available.
 11 Additionally, the committee's approved
 12 schedule for the 2019-2020 school year is also
 13 posted on the website. The first meeting of the
 14 new school year will be held on September 16th.
 15 I did just want to say that I'm just so
 16 proud of the work that this Board has done
 17 through the committee structure that we have. In
 18 December, we started with 12 Board members, 8 who
 19 were brand-new. We had to staff five standing
 20 committees. We had a variety of ad hoc
 21 committees in the last 6 months and I am just

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1 really grateful for the enthusiasm, energy, the
 2 experience we have on the Board. Six parents,
 3 three retired BCOPS educators, each with over 30
 4 years of experience. So, we really have a
 5 dynamic group, a wide diversity of experiences
 6 and I really look forward to what's going to be
 7 our first full year together with the year
 8 starting on July 1 and the work that we're able
 9 to do to advance education for our children. I
 10 just really am very appreciative of all the work
 11 that's been done.
 12 On the website, there is the list of all
 13 of the committees, the committee members, the
 14 dates of the committee meetings and also the
 15 agenda, the minutes and the videos. So, any
 16 stakeholders that want to look into that, feel
 17 free to do that. So, thank you very much.
 18 The last item is information. We have,
 19 on Board Docs, the following information. We
 20 have the revised Superintendent's Rule 1110,
 21 Community Relations, communications with the

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1 public regarding publications, radio, television,
 2 digital media.
 3 There's also a revised Superintendent's
 4 Rule 1280, Community Relations, community
 5 involvement, boundary changes. There's also the
 6 Superintendent's Rule that goes along with Policy
 7 8130, policies scheduled for review in 2019-2020.
 8 The Board of Education of Baltimore County's
 9 Policy Review Committee, policy editing
 10 conventions.
 11 We also have a questions and answers on
 12 appeals and hearings before the Board of
 13 Education of Baltimore County. That's a resource
 14 for students, parents and others to see how that
 15 process works.
 16 We also have the fiscal year `20-`21
 17 operating and capital budget schedules that
 18 includes opportunity for public input. We also
 19 have the financial report for the months ending
 20 May, 2018 and 2019. We also have the meeting
 21 minutes for the Southeast Area Education Advisory

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1 Council meetings that were held on April 3rd and
 2 May 28th.
 3 That brings us to Item S, Announcements.
 4 Our final item for the evening. Our next Board
 5 meeting is going to be Tuesday, August 6th, 2019
 6 at 6:30 p.m. right here. So, we appreciate staff
 7 and everyone that came forward to this meeting to
 8 welcome Dr. Williams and to continue the work of
 9 the school system and also to welcome Mr. Rashid.
 10 We really look forward to continuing the work
 11 together. Thank you very much. The meeting is
 12 adjourned.
